## **Chapter 2: Break the Chains of Self-Doubt**

There is a silent prison that holds more people captive than any cell with steel bars. It doesn't need locks or guards. It doesn't announce its presence with a loud bang — it whispers in the dark corners of your mind.

It's called self-doubt.

The truth is, self-doubt doesn't need evidence. It thrives on your imagination. It grows every time you replay the "what ifs" instead of standing on "God said."

The Bible is full of people who battled self-doubt.

Moses told God, "I'm not eloquent... I am slow of speech and tongue." (Exodus 4:10) Yet God chose him to lead an entire nation to freedom.

Gideon called himself the least in his family, from the weakest clan in Israel. But God called him a "mighty warrior." (Judges 6:12)

Jeremiah said he was too young to speak. But God put His words in Jeremiah's mouth and made him a prophet to the nations.

They all had a choice: Believe their self-doubt or believe God's word.

So do you.

I once heard someone say, “If you argue for your limitations, you get to keep them.”

Let that sink in.

Every time you say, “I can’t,” you strengthen the walls of your own prison. Every time you say, “I’m not enough,” you lock yourself in a room you were never meant to live in.

But what if you started arguing for your possibilities instead?

What if you started speaking life instead of limitations?

What if you reminded yourself daily that the God who called you is greater than the fears that chase you?

The chains of self-doubt aren’t broken by more compliments or external validation. They’re broken when you choose to believe what God says about you — even when your feelings don’t line up yet.

Feelings are real, but they’re not always true.

Your feelings might say you're unworthy.

Your feelings might say you're a failure.

Your feelings might say you're not loved.

But God's word says you are fearfully and wonderfully made (Psalm 139:14).

God's word says you are chosen, royal, and set apart (1 Peter 2:9).

God's word says you are more than a conqueror (Romans 8:37).

You can't always control which thoughts knock on your door, but you can control which ones you invite in to stay.

It starts with small choices.

When self-doubt says, "Don't apply for that promotion," you do it anyway.

When self-doubt says, “Don’t start that business,” you take the first step.

When self-doubt says, “Don’t share your story,” you write the first sentence.

Every act of courage chips away at the walls self-doubt built around you.

I remember a season when I felt completely unqualified to lead. I was overwhelmed, exhausted, and questioning everything. One morning, as I prayed, I felt God whisper to me, “I didn’t call you because you were qualified. I called you because I am with you.”

That changed everything.

If you’re waiting to feel 100% ready before you move, you’ll stay stuck your entire life. Readiness doesn’t precede obedience — obedience precedes readiness. When you step out, you find out just how strong God made you.

Courage isn't the absence of fear; it's moving forward in spite of it.

Self-doubt will always exist in some form. Even the most successful people feel it. But they choose not to obey it. They choose to act anyway.

Imagine if David had let self-doubt stop him from facing Goliath.

Imagine if Esther had let self-doubt keep her from going before the king.

Imagine if Jesus had let self-doubt keep Him from the cross.

You are here on purpose. You have a calling on your life that's bigger than your comfort zone. And yes, the journey will stretch you. It will test you. But it will also transform you.

When you feel unworthy, remember that God specializes in using the unlikely.

When you feel unseen, remember that God saw you before the foundation of the world.

When you feel weak, remember that His strength is made perfect in your weakness.

I want you to do something today: Write down every negative belief you have about yourself. Then, next to each one, write the truth God says about you. Speak those truths daily until they become your new default.

You can't always silence self-doubt forever, but you can learn to stop letting it run your life.

You have too much inside you to let insecurity dictate your destiny. There are books waiting to be written, songs waiting to be sung, businesses waiting to be built, lives waiting to be touched — and they're all tied to your willingness to believe in yourself the way God believes in you.

No more hiding. No more shrinking. No more waiting for permission.

Today is the day to break the chains.

Today is the day to step forward even if your voice shakes.

Today is the day to believe you are who God says you are.

And if you feel like you can't do it alone, borrow my belief. I'm standing with you, cheering for you, and praying for you.

Because I don't just believe it's possible — I believe you can.

## **Chapter 3: Stop Shrinking, Start Shining**

Have you ever felt the urge to dim your light just to make other people feel comfortable?

Have you ever played small so you wouldn't threaten someone else's insecurity?

Have you ever hidden your gifts, your ideas, your success — just to avoid the whispers, the side-eyes, or the quiet jealousy?

If your answer is yes, you're not alone. I spent years shrinking myself so I wouldn't make waves. I thought being humble meant staying hidden. I thought playing small was the way to stay “safe” — to avoid criticism, to keep people liking me, to protect my heart.

But let me tell you what I learned the hard way: God didn't give you light so you could hide it.

Jesus said in Matthew 5:14–16, “You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house.”

Read that again.

He didn't say you might be the light. He said you are the light.

The world doesn't need more people blending in. The world is desperate for people bold enough to shine.

Your light is your unique story, your gifts, your voice, your ideas. Your light is the way you show up when no one else will. It's your courage to speak up when others stay silent. It's your willingness to walk in rooms and take up the space God has given you — fully, unapologetically.

I get it. Shining is scary. Because when you shine, you become visible. When you become visible, you become a target.

People will question you: “Who do you think you are?”

When you shrink, nobody wins. You lose your purpose, and the people assigned to your light lose their inspiration.

Martin Luther King Jr. stood on that stage and declared his dream — he didn't shrink.

Mother Teresa served the forgotten and unwanted — she didn't shrink.

Jesus hung on the cross for a world that didn't understand Him — He didn't shrink.

Every major move of God in history started with someone brave enough to step into their full light.

I know you may feel unqualified. I know you might feel afraid of failing, afraid of rejection, afraid of being misunderstood. But I promise you this: There is no lasting peace in playing small.

Shrinking doesn't protect your heart — it suffocates it.

When you step into your light, you invite others to do the same. Your courage becomes contagious. Your freedom becomes permission for someone else to be free.

But I want you to hear me clearly: God doesn't waste your failures.

I remember one particular investment that went completely wrong. I lost more money than I care to admit. It embarrassed me publicly and privately. For weeks, I couldn't sleep. I kept replaying every decision in my head like a broken record.

Finally, I had to make a choice: stay stuck in regret or learn from it and move forward. I chose to rise.

I studied what went wrong. I asked hard questions. I forgave myself. And I used that failure as fuel to become a better leader, a sharper businessman, and a stronger believer.

I can stand here today and say: That failure didn't break me. It built me.

I want to challenge you to shift your perspective. Instead of seeing failure as something to be feared, see it as part of the process.

Failure doesn't disqualify you from your destiny — it often qualifies you for it. It makes you relatable. It makes you compassionate. It makes you resilient.

You don't need a perfect record to be used by God. You don't need a flawless past to make a powerful impact. You don't need to have it all together to start moving forward.

In fact, it's your failures that prepare you for your future.

There's a question I want to ask you today:

Was it after that big failure that embarrassed you and made you vow, "Never again"?

Was it after someone you trusted laughed at your ideas or told you, "Be realistic"?

But here's the problem: If your dream doesn't require God, it's too small.

We serve a God who specializes in the impossible. The One who created galaxies with His words, who breathed life into dust, who split seas and raised the dead. And yet, we come to Him with dreams that fit in our pocket — neat, manageable, and comfortable.

We forget that God isn't intimidated by big dreams. In fact, He's the author of them.

Ephesians 3:20 says, “Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us.”

Did you catch that? More than you can ask or imagine.

That means if you can fully explain it, fully control it, or fully finance it on your own — you're dreaming too small.

When I first started dreaming about building businesses, investing in real estate, impacting lives across the world

— I didn't have the resources, the connections, or the blueprint. But I had a word. And that was enough.

I remember sitting alone in an empty room, no money in the bank, no team around me, and saying out loud:

“God, if You gave me this vision, then You're going to have to make a way. I don't know how, but I know You.”

When you start dreaming with God, you stop worrying about the “how” and start focusing on the “Who.”

God doesn't need your ability as much as He needs your availability.

He doesn't need your plan as much as He needs your faith.

He doesn't need you to have it all figured out — He needs you to believe that He already has.

The enemy's greatest weapon against your destiny isn't always sin or scandal — sometimes it's simply convincing you to settle. To accept just enough instead of more

than enough. To play it safe instead of stepping into the unknown.

Your dream is not just about you. It's about everyone connected to your obedience. When you dare to dream big, you give others permission to do the same.

Look at Abraham. God told him his descendants would be as numerous as the stars. Imagine looking up at a sky full of stars with no children in sight. But Abraham believed.

Look at Joseph. God gave him dreams of leadership while he was still a teenager — and those dreams carried him through betrayal, false accusations, and prison.

Look at Mary. God told her she would carry the Savior of the world — a teenage girl from a small town. She said, “Be it unto me according to Your word.”

These people didn't play it safe. They believed beyond what they could see.

I want to challenge you today: What dream have you buried because it felt too big?

What vision did you put on a shelf because you thought, “Not me, not now”?

What promise did you stop praying about because it seemed impossible?

I dare you to pick it back up.

Write it down again.

Pray over it again.

Speak it out loud again.

Plan for it again.

Dream like God is listening — because He is.

When you talk to God about your dream, you're not making a wish. You're partnering with the One who wrote your story before you were born.

God is not intimidated by your timeline. He's not limited by your bank account. He's not shocked by your lack of connections. He is waiting for your faith to match the size of His promise.

There will always be people who think your dream is too big. That's okay. They weren't in the room when God whispered it to you. They didn't see the vision in your spirit late at night. They didn't hear your prayers through tears on the bathroom floor.

Don't expect small-minded people to understand God-sized dreams.

And don't shrink your dream to fit someone else's comfort zone.

When God plants a dream in your heart, He also plants the grace to carry it. You may not have all the answers today, but you have enough to start.

Take the first step. Make the call. Write the proposal. Save the money. Launch the business. Go back to school. Start the ministry.

You'll never feel 100% ready — but faith isn't about being ready; it's about being willing.

God didn't call you to live a life that makes sense to everyone. He called you to live a life that points back to Him. A life that makes people say, "There's no way they could have done that without God."

When your dream is God-sized, it will draw God-sized provision, God-sized favor, and God-sized miracles.

You are not too old, too young, too broken, too inexperienced, or too late. You are right on time for what God wants to do through you.

Stop waiting. Stop shrinking. Stop doubting.

You are more than enough — right now.

Because I believe you can.

## **Chapter 7: The Courage to Start Before You're Ready**
